
November 11, 1889 Washington Becomes a State

Washington is the only state in the Union that is named after a president. It's location and many coastal ports make it perfect for trade with many areas, including Canada and the countries of Asia. Tourists and visitors flock to Washington for the scenery and the outdoor sports which are so popular there. Claimed by Spain, Britain, and the United States, it finally became a state of the Union in 1889. Those settlers living in Washington had much work to do to claim the drier areas for farming by working out systems of irrigation. Wheat and fruit were grown; lumbering, fishing, and mining increased; and Washington's place as a trading center to Alaska and the Far East caused the state to become prosperous over time. These activities are still very important to Washington's economy, along with industries such as jet aircraft, aerospace, electronics, and software. Tourism also has an important place in Washington's economy, also. Besides the beautiful natural features, the fairgrounds, buildings, and Space Needle from the world's fair held in Seattle continue to bring visitors to the state. Some famous people from Washington include Bill Gates, Zach LaVine, Alex Smith, Isaiah Thomas, Ryan Clark Crocker, Wilder Graves Penfield, and Ryne Sandberg.

Look at the map of Washington below. Label the capital of Washington. Locate the cities of Seattle, Tacoma, Spokane, Richland, Pasco, Kennewick, Vancouver, Waterville, Coulee City, Ephrata, Walla Walla, Okanogan, and Bellingham, and label them on the map. Now label the Olympic Mountains, Cascade Mountains, Blue Mountains, and Rocky Mountains, along with Mount Adams, Mount Baker, Glacier Peak, Mount St. Helens, and Mount Rainier. Also, locate the Columbia River, Snake River, Colville River, Yakima River, Skagit River, Skykomish River, Okanogan River, Lake Chelan, Franklin D. Roosevelt Lake, Ozette Lake, Lake Crescent, Lake Washington, and Lake Sammamish, and label them. Lastly, label the states, provinces, or bodies of water that border Washington. When you have finished, move on to the timeline of Washington history on the next page and the research prompts that follow.
