|  <p>Blue</p> | <p>This whale is the largest animal in the world, is blue-gray and white, and uses baleen to eat krill.</p> |  <p>Bowhead</p> | <p>These dark-colored whales have a white spot on their chin, live in the Arctic, and can have more than 1 foot (30 cm) of blubber beneath their skin.</p> |
|  <p>Fin</p> | <p>These whales are the second-largest animal on Earth, have dark gray tops and lighter undersides, and a hook-shaped fin.</p> |  <p>Gray</p> | <p>These whales have blotchy gray skin and migrate from Russia and Alaska to Baja California.</p> |
