

#### Ways to Use Rubrics


Rubrics can be great tools to help you and your students work together as they grow in their writing skills. There are many ways you can use them.

One common way to use rubrics is to help grade writing assignments. They are wonderful grading helps, but there are a few cautions to keep in mind. Don't try to grade every writing assignment your student completes. Doing so can turn writing into a chore, and when your student stresses over what he or she is writing, imagination and creativity suffer. Also keep your student's age and writing ability in mind when you grade, especially for younger writers. Your fifth grader will almost certainly not write like Shakespeare, and that is okay! Grades are an important part of education, but they are not the only part.

Rubrics can also be used to track improvement. When a child sees his or her scores improving in an area, it can boost confidence and provide encouragement to continue to grow and learn.


The rubrics in this unit also include a section for giving your students feedback. It provides a way for you to praise what they've done well, encourage them that you'll work together on things they are struggling with, and help them recognize areas where they have grown.

There are bonus student checklists included in this unit so that you can give them to your students as a way to help them in their revision stage. 
